Dear members,

Many thanks to all of you who took the time to fill in the questionnaire, it is important for the committee to understand what you all think and want so that we can make sure we are all pushing in the same direction.

It highlighted a few areas that we were aware of such as the state of the downstairs of the club and slip (which we have been working on) but other areas were highlighted, such as a demand for more social sails, more notice for events, more dinghy parking and demand for RYA courses. We have taken these on board and the diary on webcollect is being populated for the year ahead, with social/picnic sails, sea racing, social events etc so please do have a look and add them to your diaries, a racking system is being built and we will be having a move around of dinghy's on the bank to maximize the space, so you might be asked to move! If we can get more boats in, its got to be in everyone's best interests...

With the feedback from the survey we have been writing a business plan, or map of where we are and where we want to get to and how. It has been a massive piece of work and my thanks go to Paul Conroy who has been at the helm of this. It contains some really ambitious plans and much needed reinvestment in the clubs assets to set the club up for a further 75 years.

The main element that underpins this is our lease. I'm glad to report that the lease negotiations are almost complete with heads of terms now having been agreed and its now in the hands of the solicitors so we should not be too far away of securing the clubs future for another 30 years.

As part of this process we have been reviewing our club structure. At present we are a members club, so we as a group own and run the club together but we are not a legal entity within our own right. So for example the current lease is held by two members on trust for the club. Whilst income from members is not taxable, income from non members is. The members also have potential liability for the club debts.

The majority of sports clubs are moving away from this structure to a CIO or charitable incorporated organization.

The major advantages to this are;

• The Club would not need to pay tax on trading income from non-members coming to music nights or hiring the club.

- Donations to the Club would be eligible for 25% tax relief
- Gifts/legacies left via wills would be eligible for favourable IHT rates (you can tell I'm an accountant!)
- Grant funding should be easier to obtain.
- The Club would be incorporated (or limited) meaning the members would not have any liability for debts of the club.
- The Club could directly hold property rather than the property being held by trustees for the club
- We would get 100% relief for business rates
- There would be no noticeable change for members

The disadvantages would be:

- Annual accounts would need to be submitted to the charities commission
- We would need an EGM to vote through the change

So not many downsides!

Once the lease is signed, I would like to invite you all to a meeting to vote on changing the clubs status to a CIO and present the business plan. However if in the meantime you have any questions or concerns please do let me know.

As you can see it has been a busy time for the committee and I would like to thank them all for there hard work!

But that's not all - We are really excited to announce we have been busy arranging a harbour festival to celebrate our 75th anniversary and the RNLIs 200th year. It is the weekend of the 28-30 June. We have got the Old gaffers back so they will be filling the harbour, there will be bands playing on a stage in the harbour throughout the afternoon/evening of Saturday, a trip up the Blyth for the smaller gaffers/luggers and then racing at sea on the Sunday for all the gaffers and SSC cruisers . More details to follow, but if you have a gaffer, make sure she is in fine fettle!

So with a jam packed season ahead I look forward to seeing you all on the water.

Roles of the committee members

President: Supporting the incoming commodore and committee.

Commodore: The principal Flag Officer. Sets a direction for the club and is responsible for the organisation and management of the club. The Commodore chairs the General Committee meetings.

Vice Commodore: Second in command, a Flag Officer and responsible for the organisation and management of sailing and associated aspects of our club.

Rear Commodore: Third in command, a Flag Officer and responsible for the organisation and management of all land based aspects of our club, and all social events including the bar, catering and website.

Hon Treasurer: Club finances, monthly budget sheets, accounts, annual audit, insurance.

Hon Membership Secretary: Membership development, managing membership database; dinghy parking applications & payments; membership reports.

Hon Secretary: Responsible for all club records, maintaining all club legal documentation, be it rates, licences, rules or health & safety etc. as well as organising and taking minutes of General Committee and General Meetings.

Social Secretary: Produce a vibrant and well-balanced social programme; recruit volunteers, coordinate events, marketing and advertising; liaise with committee for support.

Bookings Secretary: Club hire contact, manage bookings, music events.

Bosuns: Organise and oversee maintenance for club safety boats and dinghies.

Welfare Officer: The Welfare Officer's main roles are to ensure that the club has up-to-date procedures, that relevant staff and/or volunteers are aware of and follow good practice, and to be the first point of contact for any concerns, seeking advice and support from the RYA as necessary.

Overview of activities

For the dinghies: This season will see Wednesday night sailing, regular weekend sailing and training sessions. There will be sea and river sailing with the usual trips to the White Hart in Blythburgh. Our laser fleet is looking quite impressive these days! We hope to plan more sea sailing this year, so please make the effort to join in any way you can.

For the cruisers: Regular Friday evening race series, and some passage racing. We're also planning another trip or two across the North Sea to Ostend and some cruises to Lowestoft for lunch at RN&SYC. An overnight trip to Orford is also planned. The pontoon is available for short-term use with the provisions of water and electricity.

Visitors: We have visits from other clubs such as LCC, RN&SYC and RHYC

Social: Regular bar opening times with regular social evenings such as fish and chips and barbecues. We hope there will be the return of the very popular disco nights too. And to help make the bar worth a visit even on a non-sailing day, come and try the pool table.

Update on the clubhouse and equipment

Clubhouse: While less dramatic, but arguably more important than the visible external repairs and improvements of the previous year, the last year has seen the safety of the clubhouse improved. The fire inspector has been, made recommendations, and seen those recommendations carried out. The kitchen has had the gas system improved and a self extinguishing kit added to the oven. (As was seen in action during the annual dinner) This year there's some more work planned to make some more improvements to the balcony.

Slipway and pontoons: The club slipway is still the current major project. This year we will carry out the first phase which consists of removing the bottom one or two sections and making it safe for use. The second phase will require significant funding, and will see the slipway reinstated and the dinghy pen improved. The pen will need to be emptied of dinghies during the first phase which should be sometime in spring, during spring low tides. When the works aren't in progress the slipway will be open. The town slip is still an option and access to it from the dinghy pen is still available.

Safety boats: Tango - the Rigiflex 360 - has been of great use up river. Its

lower freeboard and smaller size makes it a much less imposing safety boat to drive and makes it much easier dealing with small dinghies on the river. While out at sea the committee boat and rib are still a great combination.

Club dinghies: The club dinghies (picos, laser 2000s and wayfarers) got a thorough check and clean last year, and will have the same again this year. They haven't seen as much use as previous years, but paradoxically this is a good thing - it's because members have been buying their own boats! Nonetheless, they will be serviced and ready for action again this year.

Volunteering

We recognise that our club relies on its volunteer members and that the only way the club can grow and sustain its activities is by gaining a good volunteer base. So, this season we will be focusing on volunteer development. Most clubs require all members to carry out two duties throughout the season, and we would like to encourage a similar idea so that the workload is shared. Although this will not be compulsory, we would like members to keep this in mind.

For any member keen to further their involvement in developing the activities and participating in any duties we will offer training in return for your efforts.

On the water duties: safety boat crew and helping any learn to sail courses; powerboat courses and dinghy instructor courses are available to you.

Club based duties: work parties, bar duties.

First aid courses will be offered to all helping with training and support.

Taster opportunities

Members are always welcome to bring a guest, provided that the Officer Of The Day is informed in advance. Members are responsible for and required to act as host for their guests.

Club Boat Policy

The club dinghies will be available to use on the sailing days highlighted in the calendar provided we have sufficient safety boat cover. Cost £5 per person.

Laser 2000 – Wayfarer – Pico – Topper - Laser

All dinghies to be fully inspected and should they not be fit for purpose then they **must not** be used. Any defects to be noted on the white board in the boat shed. All dinghies and equipment to be rinsed, returned and stowed correctly.

Under no circumstances may these boats be used without the appropriate Safety Boat cover

Safety Boat Policy

Any member wishing to operate the safety boats must be capable and inducted prior to use. Each safety boat must have at least two people on board. The exception is the rigiflex upriver, this can have one person.

Training is available for safety boats, please contact us to register for future training opportunities.

Please ensure the boats are washed, tidied and tied up as found.

Personal Clothing

All sailors and safety crew must be equipped with appropriate clothing and safety equipment. Buoyancy aids must be worn at all times while on pontoons and while sailing.

VHF radios

The club currently uses waterproof floating handheld radios. They are located in the bar area. Please ensure they are rinsed, returned and placed back on charge. The club operates on **Chanel 77** when at sea or past the Bailey Bridge. **Chanel 12** when in the river and to call the Harbour Master.

Dinghy Parking & Hard Standing

Southwold Sailing Club welcomes members who wish to store a boat on its land. Whether it's a tender, sailing dinghy or cruiser, we hope to accommodate you and suit your needs. We offer a total of 53 boat parking spaces comprising of 13 in the dinghy pen, 27 dinghy spaces along the bank and a further 13 spaces for larger boats such as cruisers.

There is a waiting list for cruiser hard standing in the winter and bookings are on a first come first served basis.

Club pontoons

The club has 2 pontoons. The one in the dinghy pen is for the club's safety boat and the one in front of the harbour master's office is for temporary use by members who may need to moor there for loading and off-loading gear and supplies etc. Under no circumstances should these be used for commercial purposes. In all cases the owner or skipper should be on board or in the vicinity. Should you wish to use the pontoon then please notify the Committee so that you can be accommodated on the berth and to avoid double booking.

Tides

All HW tide times in the Sailing Programme are corrected for BST. Add six and a half hours to the HW times to get an approximate time for low water. If sailing in the river add 1 hour on to the tide time as it takes an hour longer for the tide to turn in the river.

Generally all sailing is done on the flood tide; aim to be back to base by the High Water time stated in the programme if sailing at sea and plus 1 hour if sailing in the river. Never go sailing on the start of the ebb.

Club hire

The hall is available for members to hire for as little as £12 per hour. With the option of having the bar and the kitchen facility, the upstairs of the club could make the perfect setting for birthday parties and gatherings especially with a roaring fire and the ships lanterns on! Any near miss or incident must be reported to the Commodore, and an incident report form filled in. It is the policy of the SSC to learn from near misses and to avoid future incidents. All those delivering sessions or driving safety boats are encouraged to discuss openly near misses with colleagues.

- *INFORMATION*... such as liferaft, flare fired, etc.
- OVER this means 'reply to me'

Release Transmit button.

Listen on Channel 16. If you hear nothing repeat the call.

Wind & Tide

Wind and tide forecast resources:

- Weather forecast Rain or sun can determine suitability for sailing
- Windguru.com Current wind forecast
- Weatherfile.com Current wind data at the lifeboat station
- Google earth Work out wind direction in relation to the coast or river
- Magic seaweed Check for swell to factor in predictions and wind impact

Direction of tidal flow at sea:

- Flooding = North to South
- Ebbing = South to North
- Tide changes inshore first
- Tide times are at harbour entrance. Add 1 hour for up river. Make sure times are in BST

Wind direction impact on the sea state:

- **Onshore wind** produces waves and encourages swell
- Offshore wind reduces waves and knocks energy out of swell
- Wind against tide creates choppy sea. Can cause problems in capsize
- Wind and tide same direction can produce swell, depending on swell direction (difficult to sail against wind and tide).

The safe side to enter the harbour on the ebb is the south side.

Tide cycle: Two high and two low tides every 24 hours and 50 mins due to tidal 'bulges' created by the gravitational effects of the Earth and Moon. The Luna day is 24 hours and 50 mins. The moon revolves around the earth in the same direction as the Earth rotates, therefore by the time the earth has rotated once the moon is not in the same place as when it started and it takes the Earth another 50 mins to catch up with the moon.

With this in mind, if two tide cycles take 24 hours and 50 mins then one cycle takes 12 hours 25 mins and half a cycle takes 6 hours and 12.5 mins. Half a cycle meaning from high tide to low tide. This is why the tide is never the same time every day.

Tide at harbour entrance: The harbour entrance has a funnel effect as it narrows at the knuckle. This accelerates the rate of flow through the last section of the entrance where it then joins with the tide flowing from south to north. The tide also flows through the windows which join the river flow

sideways-on. In the last part of the entrance the currents all then combine with the sideways tidal flow, creating turbulence.

The Rule of Twelfths

The rule of twelfths refers to the flow of a tidal range over a six-hour cycle where the tide will flow from high tide to low tide or low tide to high tide. Many people think that the tide just flows in and out of the harbour at a steady speed whereas in fact it starts off slow, speeds up in the middle and then slows down again. The following table shows a very simple explanation of the rule of twelfths.

Numbers 1-12 represent the tidal range (height from high to low tide) divided into 12 sections.

The hours 1-6 represent the time it takes for the tide to go from high tide to low tide.

This table will hopefully clarify why it is not a good idea to go sailing in the middle of an ebb tide and to make sure you enter the harbour before the ebb starts to flow. Sailing in through the harbour entrance in the 3rd and 4th hour of an ebb may be daunting especially given certain other factors such as wind direction and strength.


With this info we can work out when the tide will be at its strongest and can help make a decision as to safety when sailing out of the harbour. We can also predict the tide height at a given point of the tide.

Laying An Olympic Race Course



The Triangle or Olympic course offers competitors the full array of sailing angles to the wind with reaches, beats and downwind legs in various combinations.

The marks can be set using bearings from Mark 3 as the reference point.

Often Marks 1 and 2 are set up in a chain sequence.

Mark 1 is positioned using a bearing back to Mark 3.

Mark 2 is positioned using bearings from Mark 2 and Mark 1, and from Mark 2 to Mark 3.

There are various positions for the start and finish lines However it is easiest to use a start line halfway up the middle of the beat.
